
2016 New York Declaration - Leaders Summit

What we want to achieve in 2023

Build on achievements and address gaps to strengthen comprehensive responses based on national ownership complemented by a multi-stakeholder and partnership approach through:

Advancing the arrangements for burden and responsibility sharing:

- support platforms
- regional and national arrangements
- financing arrangements and tracking
- · development cooperation
- inclusion in data systems
- GCR in emergency responses

Implementing current pledges and developing new ones that are of high quality and impact and focus on:

- inclusive policy pledges implemented through matching, especially to address gaps
- broadened base of support (expanded partnerships, expanded and deepened engagement of governments)
- expanded opportunities for solutions (3rd country, local integration, voluntary return, and peacebuilding)
- both international and domestic pledges


Pledges and contributions are commitments by States and other stakeholders that advance the objectives of the Global Compact on Refugees to achieve tangible benefits for refugees and host communities.

Multistakeholder pledges are joint pledges with a large-scale reach, working towards an ambitious common goal. They are transformational, putting in place long-term arrangements that advance burden and responsibility sharing, drawing from a clearly defined resource base, donorship, or financial instrument linked to implementation.

In the lead up to the Global Refugee Forum 2023, a number of multistakeholder pledges are under development. All of these pledges are working towards securing one or more of the eight key outcomes for the GRF, which will guide future engagement in comprehensive responses.

Concrete example (academic engagement) Shifting Power: Advancing Localization of Knowledge and Elevating the Voices of Host and Displaced Communities

- 1. Invest in the capacity of institutions in low and middle-income in support of the 15by30 campaign
 - Scholarships, postgraduate fellowships, faculty positions, research
- 2. Connect academic institutions
 - North-South & South-South academic partnerships, mentoring programmes and participation
 of academics with lived experience of forced displacement in global policy fora
- 3. Amplify the knowledge produced
 - Platforms for knowledge to inform policymaking at all levels, new academic courses, track and share progress


GCR Objective 3: Expand access to third-country solutions
